

Values, such as humility, consensus, and the priesthood of all believers, lead to a flat hierarchy and a communal pragmatism. We celebrate leaders such as Dan West, Sarah Major, M.R. Zigler, and Anna Mow, but in their day, they stirred controversy by the manner of their leading. So, what does it mean to lead in today's church and world? FINANCIAL RESOURCE TEAM REPORT

The Financial Resource Team is pleased to report the financial results for quarter ending March 31st, 2024.

The First Quarter 2024 results are:

Expenses = \$12,074
Income = \$14,810
Designated fund allocations held in savings and CDs = \$143,017.30
Non-Designated funds held in savings, CDs, and checking = \$196186.68
The planned 2024 budget includes:

Expenses = \$70,874.57

Expenses = \$79,874.57 Income of \$50,100.00

The 2024 budget includes allocations for a part time DE. The actual expenses are dependent on the timing for hiring the part-time DE.

The forecasted income includes \$12,000 in rental income for the residence portion of the West Marva District Office.

The lease for the office copier has expired and the Board has elected buy out the copier and forgo rental of a new copier for the foreseeable future.

In summary, we continue to explore opportunities to reduce expenses and increase income for the continued operations of the West Marva district.

We continue to pray with time and dedication that we can overcome our daily challenges and grow our ability to fulfill Gods desire to seek and find opportunities of outreach through the mission of the West Marva District.

MINISTERIAL LEADERSHIP TEAM REPORT— ORDINATION RENEWAL TIME

It is that time of year again. It is time for all ordained ministers to begin searching through their files and try to figure out how many CEU's they have earned in the last 5 years. If you are a part-time minister, you will need 2.5 CEU's while a full-time minister needs 5. If, in the last 5 years, you have attended both days of the district conference, you have earned .5 CEU. If there are things that you have done and feel you earned a CEU, then you need to submit it to the district office, or to John Ellifritz at jellifrit@k12.wv.us. Begin checking your records now and do not wait until the last minute.

One of the required classes all ordained ministers must take every 5 years is an ethics class. This year the class will be held on October 26 from 9 until 3 at the Moorefield Church of the Brethren. All ordained ministers should have received a letter by mail that includes a registration slip to send back to the district office. The deadline to have this done is May 31. This also includes a check for \$7 made out to the district to cover the cost of the required book for this class. If you have not received a letter, then you should contact the district office or John Ellifritz. If you cannot make this date, other ethic classes are held in our neighboring districts. Contact the district office or John Ellifritz to find out the date and times of these classes if needed.

Deacon Ministry – How important is it in the life of your church?

In the Church of the Brethren, deacon ministry is a vital and significant expression of our caregiving ministries to individuals and families. The 1997 Annual Conference statement, "Deacon Ministries in the Church of the Brethren." states the vision for a deacon ministry as follows:

"Deacons are called to be dedicated caregivers who use their spiritual gifts in a shared ministry of concern for the total well-being of God's people. Deacons are to be Christ-like, welcoming, nurturing, reconciling, sensitive to the presence of God's spirit in their lives and in the lives of others, witnessing for Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord within and beyond the Body of Christ, the church."

Deacons play such an important role in the life of the church but are they aware of their duties? Have you ever considered having a training session for your deacons? You might say our numbers are small, but why not consider inviting neighboring congregations to come together for a one-day retreat. BRETHREN BITS by BETTY DZUBBA KEYSER CHURCH of the BRETHREN FOUNDED 100 Years Ago in 1924

Once more we have the opportunity to learn something more about one of our churches. As we've noticed over the years we are familiar with the congregations but often there are some features which make each church extraordinary—including surprises. Did you realize Keyser is celebrating in 2024? They are sharing information each month during their services.

Keyser is celebrating 150 years since the town was named "Keyser" and the governing men organized what became a city with some interesting developments and history. The Keyser Church of the Brethren also has a reason to celebrate during 2024. The Methodists and Presbyterians had established small churches in Keyser long before the Civil War. By the end of the hostilities both denominations found their buildings destroyed by fires from the warring troops by the time the war was over.

Until 1924, there was no established Church of the Brethren in the town. Elder Geroge W. Leatherman who had ties to the Brethren at Beaver Run, moved to the New Creek Valley, near what is today the Keyser Walmart and conducted farming enterprises. The first "Leatherman Church" was located on the Cut Off Road not far from the Duling Methodist Church. Later, this group moved the location of their meeting house to the Sunnyside community.

There were ties to many of the Brethren families who had moved from the Grant County area where the Knobley Church of the Brethen has been having services and after the early 1900's many of these families began moving into Keyser as more employment opportunities were available due to the B&O railroad shops and the growing community of Keyser.

The date of the first Brethren worship services in Keyser are unknown. Evidence indicates it was likely prior to 1911. Those first years the Odd Fellows Hall on Mineral Street was rented and public services began. The Mystic Chain Hall on North Main Street was also used.

Charter members of the church were Dr. Harry & Ruth Coffman, Charles & Nora Ludwick, Grace Harris Cook and Rosa Martin, Harvey & Melinda Arnold, Grayson & Minnie Poland, Jesse & Beulah Rotruck, Frank & Jessie Rotruck, Marie Rotruck, Alva & Lucy Rotruck and Marie Rotruck according to Dr. Emmert Bittinger.

Growth was noted when in 1916 the New Creek Congregation sent a request to District Meeting for the right to solicit funds for a church house. Due to the first World War this project was slowed since prices were inflationary during that war. It was not until 1919 District Conference gave strong support for plans for building a church in Keyser and encouraged all the district churches to respond generously toward this solicitation.

A desirable lot located on the corner of Main Street and Fort Avenue was purchased on January 25, 1919. Soon thereafter work was begun. Most or all of the work was done by volunteers, and progressed rapidly forward so that the church house was dedicated on December 20, 1920. The dedication speaker was Elder Jeremiah Thomas of Sandy Creek. Brother B.W. Smith who had been serving as one of the pastors conducting services at nearby Sunnyside held revival services and new members were added.

The work of the first pastor, Russell G. West began June 11, 1922. At that time the membership was fifty with Sunday School attendance averaging forty-five. Under the guidance of a pastor (rather than using the Elders and brothers who donated their time and money to preaching from church to church) rapid progress took place as the church grew and gained recognition in the town and within the District.

In 1924 the territory of the New Creek congregation was divided. Those worshipping at Keyser chose the name First Church of the Brethren. Since 1960 this congregation has been known officially as the Keyser Church of the Brethren.

Various additions were made as the original facility no longer was large enough to accommodate the congregation. During those years the church purchased and remodeled the double house next door which provided ten new classrooms and an office. In 1955 a Wicks pipe organ was installed. Later, in 1980 a new and modern educational facility with kitchen, fellowship hall and restrooms, library, pastor's study and church office replaced the former quarters.

In 1935 the church purchased a house and lot on First Street, a very short walk from the church to be used as parsonage.

Upon arrival of the first pastor the membership was only fifty. By 1925 it was up to 150 and by 1937 there were 390 members. Several pastors have served since the early 1920's and the congregation grew within the city and the Keyser members were active in many facets of the West Marva District work over the years.

Heidi Gardner shares the information the church has had Vacation Bible Schools annually since 1922. The Brethren in Keyser were pioneers in establishing ecumenical Bible Schools. Rev. Russell West directed the first Community Bible School held during the summer of 1928 in Keyser.

During the 1940's Keyser played a role in assisting with the West Marva camping program. The pastor at the time and the late Arnold Ludwick were instrumental in obtaining the property at Camp Galilee for the district camp. Many of the Keyser adults and youth assisted with building the cabins. Keyser youth and counsellors were active over those years in the activities at Camp Galilee.

Westernport Church of the Brethren Upcoming Events:

The youth group has some service projects for the community and a back-to-school trip in August. This is a fundraiser to help them raise money to achieve what they want to do.
